Arrangements are now nearly completed for the grand Fourth of July celebration, one week from next Tuesday. Large posters have been printed and mailed to the various towns surrounding. The ladies of both churches will serve all manner of refreshments on that day.

Property Bought With Pension Money Not Exempt.

The local assessors have received notice from the state assessors to exempt no property from taxation because it was bought with pension money. All property that was free from taxation last year will, however, be exempt this year, but thereafter no property will escape taxation on the ground that it was paid for with pension money. All parties seeking exemption from taxation must seek redress in the United States courts, as the local or state assessors have no authority in the matter. The attorney-general thinks the practice of exempting property from taxation, because it was paid for with pension money, is illegal and unconstitutional, and the case is now in the court of appeals and will probably be taken to the supreme court for a final decision. Several parties in this vicinity are raising a howl because their property which, until this year, has been free from taxation, is to be assessed the same as other property not paid for with pension money.—Binghamton Republican.
